

2024 Dog Licenses

Village ordinance 6.08.020 and Wisconsin Statute 174.05 require you to license your dog(s) by April 1st of each year. Dogs must be at least 5 months of age and have a current rabies vaccination. Licenses purchased after April 1st will be assessed a \$5.00 late fee. For dogs that become 5 months of age during the year or for newly acquired dogs, you are required to purchase a license within 30 days of acquiring such animal (late fee does not apply). The law also applies to renters. Licenses can be applied for at the Village Office.

Please include a SASE if you would like your license mailed to you.

Fees are as follows:

Spayed/Neutered \$5.00 Unaltered Dogs \$10.00

The Bowling Alley

In the 1930s, The Masonic Odd Fellows Lodge decided to construct a bowling alley in Fraternity Hall. The basement was dug out by



hand with the help of horses and two alleys were carved into the newly dug basement and open for lodge member use. With the popularity of the alleys, two more were constructed and the space was opened to the public in 1939. George Kellar was one of the first men to manage the



bowling alley. Harlan Bennett and Matt Lieberg were also some of the earlier managers of the alleys. The lanes hired many Oakfield teenagers at the time to set pins for 3 cents a lane. Cliff Hobbs ran the lanes

after Mr. Lieberg. Shortly after World War II, the Masonic Lodge transferred the bowling alley to private ownership. Carl Ick ran the bowling alley until 1952 when he sold it to Lawrence Schaefer. The Oakfield Lanes were upgraded with semi-

automatic pin-setting machines but still required teenage assistance. The Schaefer Family operated the Bowling alley until April 1975 ending the alley's 40-plus years of entertainment for Oakfield.

Radon Tests Urged

During January, Radon Action Month, the Fond du Lac County Health Department is making a special push to urge everyone to test their home for radon. Radon exposure is the second leading cause of lung cancer overall and leading cause of lung cancer for non-smokers. The Department of Health Services estimates that 1 of 10 homes in Wisconsin have high radon levels.


Radon is a naturally occurring gas in Wisconsin soils and is responsible for an estimated 21,000 lung cancer deaths each year according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Radon gas can move freely through soil and up into the atmosphere where it is safely diluted. However, when radon enters a building it can become concentrated and reach unhealthy levels. Radon can enter a building through cracks and openings in the foundation, floor, walls, sump pumps, plumbing, wiring, or ductwork. In 2022, 43% of tests performed in Fond du Lac County had high levels of radon.

You cannot smell, taste, or see radon; the only way to know if you have high radon levels is to test for it. With more people working from home, it is more important than ever to test homes for radon because testing is the only way to know if a home has radon levels at or above 4 picocuries, which presents a health risk. More than 100 radon mitigation contractors in Wisconsin are nationally certified to install radon mitigation systems if elevated radon levels are found. Thousands of systems are installed in existing homes in Wisconsin each year.

In conjunction with Radon Action Month, the Fond du Lac County Health Department will be offering short-term radon test kits during the month of January for \$5.00 each. Kits can be picked up at 160 S. Macy Street, 3rd floor, Monday through Friday from 8-4:30 P.M. Kits are also available through your local city/town clerk.

Short-term radon test kits are also available year-round for \$10.

Ord. 12.28.010: Snow & ice removal

A. The owner, occupant, or person in charge of any property within the village of Oakfield fronting or abutting any public sidewalk shall be responsible for removing snow from the entire width and length of said sidewalk within twelve (12) hours of the end of a snowfall.

B. Any ice formed on the sidewalk that cannot immediately be removed shall be sprinkled with sand, salt, or both.
